Meet the staff:

Each newsletter we will introduce members of the school team to you, so you are able to find out a little more about their roles and interests. For the first newsletter I felt it was appropriate to introduce myself as I am new to my role at Fleggburgh Primary.

Robbie Houghton – Interim Executive Headteacher

I have been teaching for 16 years, working with classes from Year 1 to Year 6. I completed a teaching and music degree at the University College of Ripon and York St John, where I thoroughly enjoyed four years of teaching practises in a wide range of locations: from inner-city Middlesbrough to Rotherham and small North Yorkshire villages. Alongside my teaching I continued with the music aspect of my degree which included regular performances with the choir and orchestra in venues such as York Minster. Music has been a fantastic way for me to see, and play in interesting venues such as the Festival Hall and the Royal Albert Hall.

For my final year my focus was solo performance so I spent a lot of time practising and playing my cello, carrying it up and down the stairs to my top floor flat! I have continued my interest in music and spent many hours rehearsing with children at Freethorpe for end of year productions such as Bugsy Malone, a wide range of musical events and concerts, as well as teaching the ukulele.

My role as a teacher has changed over time: I have been the Assistant Headteacher at Freethorpe for a large number of years now but my role has also seen me working around the county supporting other head teachers and helping schools to develop and improve. I have previously covered the headship during periods of absence and maternity leave at Freethorpe. The day to day variety of my job is part of what I love about it.

I have a five year old son, Noah, and when I returned from maternity leave my working hours altered to 3 days a week. On a Thursday and Friday it is lovely to be able to be on the other side of the fence, being the parent doing the school run at the end of the week!

Uniform and PE Kit:

Despite the weather being quite cold at this time of year, the children will still be taking part in outdoor PE lessons. Therefore please can you ensure that they have suitable clothing for PE lessons, which includes a pair of tracksuit trousers and a change of top. It is also very helpful to ensure all items of clothing the children have in school are named as this will help reduce the amount of lost property generated and minimise the number of items children misplace. The children are able to bring a bottle of water in to school but please try to do this each day so that they have a clean, fresh drink.



Attendance, Holidays and Leave of Absence:

Punctuality:

Most of our pupils arrive at school in good time. We have very few pupils who are late on a consistent basis. However, lateness has a negative impact. Being late can disrupt lessons, affect achievement and embarrass/upset your child. Some recent research shows that being late adds up to loss of learning: 5 minutes late every day adds up to 3 days lost each year, 10 minutes adds up to 6 days lost each year. If you were 30 minutes late every day it would add up to 19 days lost each year - being late means missing out!

Why is regular attendance at school important? Regular school attendance will mean that your child has a better chance in life. Your child will achieve better when they go to school all day, every school day. They learn better. They make friends. They are happier. They have a brighter future. Missing school means missing out! Schools are expected to have an overall attendance of 95% or above. Research published by the Department for Education (DfE) suggests that children with poor attendance are more likely not to be in education, employment or training when they leave school.

Holidays and leave of absence:

Our school policy about requesting leave of absence has been in place for a number of years now but we have copied the key information below as a reminder of how the process works within school:

In line with Government expectations **headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances.**

- Service personnel returning from / scheduled to embark on a tour of duty abroad.
- Where a period of leave has been recommended as part of a parent's or child's rehabilitation from a medical or emotional issue. Evidence may be requested from qualified professionals, such as a doctor.
- Attendance at the wedding / funeral of a close family member.
- A short break as a family, due to the fact that employer commitments mean that this cannot be taken in **any** school holiday (including Half Terms) – evidence may be requested from an employer

Other times when permission could be given include

- approved educational activities such as music exams
- religious observance
- or approved higher level sporting competitions (eg County or national representation).

The school **cannot** accept as an exceptional circumstance the fact that a holiday is cheaper during term time, or for birthday treats.

Applications for leave of absence will be looked at on a case by case basis.

If you do need to take your child out of school during term time, we would ask that you please respect these new regulations under which we must now work and **make very clear on the 'Leave of Absence' form how the circumstances are exceptional.**
